Jesus is the Suffering Savior

He was despised and rejected by men, a man of sorrows, and familiar with suffering. ... He was pierced for our transgressions, he was crushed for our iniquities, the punishment that brought us peace was upon him, and by his wounds we are healed. - Isaiah 53:3,5

God's Words of Love

Valentine's Day cards contain words that are chosen very carefully. They are meaningful words of love and affection. Sometimes when we are sending a valentine to someone, we might even agonize over which words to use. We want to choose the right words that express the deep love we have.

How about the words printed above by the prophet Isaiah? Would you include any of his words in a card to your loved one? At first thought you would say, "Absolutely not!" Words like "despised... rejected... sorrows... suffering... punishment" would be the last choice for a Valentine's Day card! But the Bible surprises us. These words from God are really a wonderful expression of his true love for people.

The first thing to understand is that Isaiah was writing about Jesus. Jesus, God's Son, was sent to earth to be the world's Savior. The Bible tells us that because of sin there was punishment looming for all people. But Jesus took that punishment on himself. Jesus is our Savior who suffered for sinners. He took

all this suffering on himself, including death on a cross, so that people wouldn't suffer eternally.

The second thing to remember is that we are talking about something very personal to all of us. We were the ones Jesus came to suffer for. We were the ones who were headed to the punishment of eternal separation from God. Our sinful thoughts, words, and actions condemned us. But as the prophet wrote, "He was pierced for our transgressions, he was crushed for our iniquities, the punishment that brought us peace was upon him, and by his wounds we are healed."

Jesus' love for us is deep and long-lasting. It's not a shallow love that we might receive from others, or a love that is here today and gone tomorrow. Jesus' love is eternal. He promises that since he suffered and gave up his life for us, he will continue to love us each and every day.

Every time you open the Bible it's like Valentine's Day. These are God's words of love for you.

Merry Christmas and Happy New Year!

It has now been raining almost everyday here in Malawi, which has cooled the heat but it still isn't the "White Christmas" I'm used to. But nothing about this Christmas season is like I'm used to. Instead of the hustle and bustle of shopping centers, it is the usual hustle and bustle of the open-air markets in the city -sometimes a little more hustle if it is raining. There are no Christmas lights lining houses or city streets—we are lucky if our regular lights are on. There is a distinct lack of Christmas music on the radio 24 hours a day.

While all the trappings of Christmas are missing, the real reason we are celebrating is universal to any time and any place. Jesus, our promised Savior, has been born. In fact, the focus may be even clearer here because of the lack of commercialism associated with Christmas. When discussing family Christmas traditions, most Malawians I've spoken with stated they would go to church, and then come home and have a nice family meal (chicken or beef, rice, and relish). No mention of gifts at all

This year for Christmas I spent the holiday at the lake with a few friends who remained in Malawi. We left Lilongwe in the early afternoon and arrived after dark due to getting lost (Google maps said there was a road that didn't exist—a regular occurrence, unfortunately). As soon as we pulled up to the house we were staying at and I got out of the car and immediately noticed the stars! They had shown so brightly. It made me think of the star that the Magi followed to find the baby, Jesus. The stars shine so brightly in Malawi, but I can't imagine how brightly that star must have shone!

I used some of my beach time to reflect on the year I have spent here in Malawi. I've learned so much and grown-both spiritually and personally. I've also experienced so many firsts--my first safari, my first cockroach, driving on the left side of the road from the right side of the car. I've travelled to new places. Throughout all of this I'm reminded at how blessed I am to be here in Malawi-serving the Lord and his people-experiencing such amazing things. As I embark on another year of adventures, I recognize I have much more to learn and grow from.

My prayer for the upcoming year is for your continued support of Lutheran Mobile Clinic. I pray that through God's grace and your support, our clinic will continue to provide both spiritual and physical care to every patient that comes to our four clinic sites. I pray that the Lord continues to bless LMC with dedicated and professional staff. And finally, I pray for continued safety for our patients and staff, and for you at home, in America and Canada.

Pastor's Report:

WHAT WILL YOU DO IN THE NEW YEAR?

So how many of those New Year's resolutions have you broken so far? None! Some! All! I pray that the resolutions found in the newsletter last month have not been broken; keeping them means walking in step with God's holy Word. Here are four more to add to that list.

God grant us the spiritual wisdom to stick to these Biblical resolutions...and God bless you as you do!

1. Give thanks in all circumstances (1 Thess. 5:18)

Remember why we celebrated Christmas? It was because of the gift of God's one and only Son come into the world to be our Savior. What greater reason to give thanks do we have than that! But this also means to give thanks during hardships; to give thanks for our food, jobs, houses, and livelihood; to give thanks for family, and so much more

2. Therefore encourage one another and build each other up (1 Thess. 5:11)

How about choosing a fellow member of shut-in to visit this year How about asking a fellow member how they are doing or if there is anything you can do to help How about sharing the promises of God with the fellow member who is going through a rough patch How about going out of your way and taking time out of your busy schedule to stop in and see that individual who has lost a loved one in the past few years

3. Now to each one the manifestation of the Spirit is given for the common good...Now you are the body of Christ, and each one of you is a part of it. (1 Cor. 12:7, 27)

This means using your gift (yes God has given you a gift) for the service of the church Could you say yes when asked to serve on a committee or board Could you try teaching Sunday School

This means being active as a missionary in your own mission field—your life!

4. But the fruit of the Spirit is love, joy, peace, patience, kindness, goodness, faithfulness, gentleness and self-control. (Gal 5:22, 23)

Do you lose your temper easily; use God's Word and his help to be more patient and gentle This means living our lives in such a way that people know we are children of God

Jesus answered, "Do you think that these Galileans were worse sinners than all the other Galileans because they suffered this way? Or those eighteen who died when the tower in Siloam fell on them - do you think they were more guilty than all the others living in Jerusalem?" (Luke 13: 2, 4)

We Want Answers

Why did that happen to him and not to me? Why did that seemingly innocent group of people suffer so horribly? Was there a reason God allowed tragedy to happen to them? Did God send it as a judgment? Was it coincidence? Was it karma?

When tragedy strikes, we have questions and we want answers. We're no different from the people in today's reading. Why did Roman Govenor Pontius Pilate kill those people up north in Galilee? Was it something they said or did? Were they being punished for their evil actions? What about that accident down south in Siloam? Were those people the target of God's justice? Had he finally had enough with them? Did they get what they had coming?

Why do these tragedies happen? We want a reasonable explanation that makes sense. We want to connect cause and effect. We're especially concerned and even baffled when tragedy strikes in the lives of outwardly good people or professing Christian people. Did we miss something? Is there more than meets the eye? Is this world out of God's control, or worse, does God not care?

God doesn't provide us with answers to our every question. He does, however, speak to us with his assurances in the Bible. There he reminds us that he is in perfect control of the world even though things often seem chaotic, uncertain, and random. He reminds us that he is a just and gracious God. When tragedy strikes, he encourages us to focus not on the answers he chooses to keep hidden from us, but on the answers he gives in his Word. God, in his grace, sent his Son to carry out his gracious will. Jesus suffered the ultimate "tragedy" on Calvary's cross. His Word tells us that although we deserve God's punishment because of our sin, Jesus died to cleanse us from every sin. He reminds us that our heavenly Father is in control. He tells us that even when tragedy strikes, he will turn it into blessing for his people. When tragedy strikes, let's look for answers where God gives them - in his Word.

Prayer: Dear heavenly Father, we have so many questions. Help us seek you and your answers in your Word. Comfort us with the knowledge that you are in control and help us accept your heavenly will. Amen




Our first youth group gathering is in the books and it was a success. We had a Bible Study; we made some plans; and we played a game.
