

THE MEASURE OF A MUSTARD SEED

Jesus told a parable: "The kingdom of heaven is like a mustard seed, which a man took and planted in his field. Though it is the smallest of all your seeds, yet when it grows, it is the largest of garden plants and becomes a tree, so that the birds of the air come and perch in its branches" (Matthew 13:31,32).

Who is America's richest man? America's tallest mountain? Largest lake? Largest city? Most populous state? If you answered Jeff Bezos, Mt. McKinley, Lake Superior, New York City, and California, you're part of the proof that Americans pay attention to big things. We live in bigger houses, eat larger meals, and work longer hours than almost any other people in the world. We tend to live by the motto, "Bigger is better."

But Jesus takes the "less is more" approach. He says: "The kingdom of heaven is like a mustard seed." Have you ever seen a mustard seed? It's so small that you could hold thousands in your hand. Why would Jesus tell us this? Because it's possible to be so focused on what *looks* big and impressive that we overlook him and his blessings.

It's a common mistake. At first glance, there was nothing big or impressive about Jesus. When he came to establish his kingdom, he arrived as a child of a poor girl in a conquered country. He was born in a barn. He grew up in an obscure village. His followers were nobodies. He never held a high position. He never lived in a palace or even a house of his own. After a few years in the public eye, he was killed on a cross like he was a ruthless criminal. On Good Friday he *looked* small and powerless.

When Jesus spoke about the mustard seed, he gave us a short story that speaks volumes for our lives. The measure of a mustard seed is not its tiny size, but the huge plant that it grows into. In the same way, the measure of Jesus' humble life and death is not how it appears to the human eye or if it meets some human standard, but what he accomplished. By his perfect life and his innocent death, Jesus has freed the world from the guilt of sin. He paid the ransom price God requires from sinners. Countless millions who have put their trust in him have become part of his eternal kingdom.

When Jesus rose from his humble grave to conquer death on Easter morning, he proved that what seems small and weak is amazingly powerful. And we need that reminder from time to time, don't we?



We need that reminder when our love for regularly gathering together for worship begins to wane. We need it, because it's all too easy to push worship aside if we forget the power of the message of Jesus found in the Word. We need that reminder when all the things of life are taking our attention away from Jesus. We need it, because it's all too easy to let Jesus become a low priority and overlook him and his blessings. We need that reminder when things in life aren't going well. We need it, because it's all too easy to let the problems in life make us think that Jesus is small and powerless.

But Jesus is not small and powerless. He is great and glorious. He is the Way, the Truth and the Life. As such, let us stay connected to his power through constant and regular use of his Word in worship, Bible Class and personal devotions.

JESUS CARES WORSHIP AT THE CROSS

Our last Jesus Cares Worship at the Cross service was in November, but we would like to start having them again. The Worship at the Cross program is a simplified service that follows a format appropriate for people with a cognitive disability, including people with forms of dementia. Pictures and symbols lead participants through the parts of the service. These services provide individuals with special needs the opportunity to hear God's Word, participate in activities and engage in fellowship with family members, volunteers and community members.

In order to reach and invite as many of our local group homes to our service as possible, we could use your help. If this is something you would be able to help with, please talk to Pastor Neumann. We want to personally visit each group home and see if there is a day and time that works best, as well as providing them with information on what we will do. Our goal is to have our next Worship at the Cross service in April.

YOUTH GROUP LOCK-IN

The Youth Group will be having a lock-in at our Black River Falls location on Friday—March 22, starting at 5 p.m. The Youth Group is open to all youth in 7-12th grade. A supper meal will be provided for them at 5 p.m. and parents are asked to be to church no later than 8 a.m. Saturday morning to pick their youth up.

If attending, the youth are encouraged to bring:

- 1) A six or twelve pack of soda to share with those at the lock-in
- 2) A snack to share with those at the lock-in
- 3) Board games they might like to play
- 4) A pillow and sleeping bag in case they get tired and want to sleep
- 5) Anything else that they might need in case they would like to sleep



THE LIVE TOMB – A UNIQUE OPPORTUNITY TO WITNESS



What is a live tomb? It's an oxymoron – two words at odds with each other, but used to describe the same thing. It's also a way we could describe Jesus' tomb – he was dead, but rose to life. It's also what we call a unique opportunity to create more public awareness in our community about Easter events. We are again setting up a display of a tomb with live "Roman soldiers" standing guard at our Black River Falls location. Members are needed to help guard the tomb.

Like last year, there will be three hour shifts of two or three Roman guards in front of the closed tomb from 7:30 p.m. Friday (after the Good Friday service) to 5:30 a.m. Easter Sunday. At that time the tomb is opened we will have two angels waving to people as they come to the sunrise service at 8 a.m. We will have snacks, a fire pit for warmth and electric lighting for night. There will be handouts for anyone that stops with questions about what we are doing.

This is a living display, not a reenactment. Men, women and children may help guard the tomb as Roman soldiers – we will need a lot of help with this. We need two people to be angels for 2½ hours Sunday morning. We will need help setting up the tomb and help taking it down. Set-up will be Saturday, April 13 at 9 a.m. Take-down will be Saturday, May 4 at 9 a.m. This is very enjoyable fellowship! Come forward and help us witness to our community the saving love of our Lord. Sign-up sheets will be at both Cataract and Black River Falls locations during Lent. The pew edition of the new hymnal will be designed to make the text and music on the page clear and intuitive for all worshipers. Separate accompaniment editions for liturgy, psalms, psalter, and hymns will provide a robust resource for organists and pianists. Three settings of the main communion service will be included in the hymnal pew edition, each following similar worship structures while varying the musical style. Several additional musical settings are in development and will be made available digitally.

In addition to performance guidelines like tempo markings, the "Accompaniment for the Hymns" edition will include additional musical options for many hymns. A team within the Hymnal Project called the Musicians' Resource Group is gathering even more arrangements for other instruments not included in the accompaniment edition, such as brass, flute, and guitar.

After four years of development, the updated lectionary for the new hymnal was recently completed. Each Sunday, the three Scripture readings, Prayer of the Day, Psalm of the Day, and Verse of the Day will now fall under one theme. The new Commentary on the Propers will help leaders plan their worship around these integrated service themes.

Each of these elements contributes to the Hymnal Project's overall mission, which reads, "We begin our task so that worshipers now and long into the future can both hear for themselves and proclaim to God and the people around them the saving work of Jesus Christ."



CMO totals for 2018 and CMO subscriptions for 2019

(The following articles are from the February 19 issue of the Together Newsletter)

Congregation Mission Offerings (CMO) received in 2018 totaled \$21,111,878. We are grateful for this generous support of our synod's mission and ministry. The total, however, was \$246,000 (1.2%) below the offerings received in 2017 and \$148,000 (0.7%) less than what congregations had indicated in their CMO subscriptions for the year. More than a decade of flat, and now even decreasing, CMO has made it increasingly challenging to maintain our current level of ministry, not to mention to seize some of the many gospel opportunities that God is graciously placing before us.

Adding to that challenge is the fact that subscriptions for 2019 are \$20,913,700, nearly 1% less than 2018 receipts. Since our planning forecasted that subscriptions would be met in 2018 and that subscriptions for 2019 would increase by 0.5%, the task to maintain and expand ministry has become even more difficult. The results for 2018 and subscriptions for 2019 are \$350,000 less than the forecast and compound to reductions from what was used for planning the next biennium of \$454,000 and \$456,000 for Fiscal Year 20 and Fiscal Year 21, respectively.

One bit of good news is that offerings for January 2019 were 6.4% higher than the January offerings in 2018.

At its meeting later this week, the Synodical Council will be looking to adopt a Ministry Financial Plan that recognizes these financial realities. All areas of ministry have been asked to look for ways to economize and to plan for less spending than what had been anticipated. Once a plan for the next two years is adopted by the Synodical Council, it will be forwarded to the synod convention this summer for approval.

As the economy improves, we pray that God will enable congregations to meet—and even exceed—their CMO subscriptions in 2019.

Big steps for the WELS Hymnal Project in 2019

he development of the new WELS hymnal and its supplementary products is making significant progress this year in anticipation of the final release scheduled for Advent 2021. A preview of the new hymnal will be available in 2020.

"It's really wrapping up," said Hymnal Project Director Rev. Michael Schultz. "Almost every aspect of the main content is going to be finished at the end of the calendar year."

The Executive Committee of the Hymnal Project reviews and finalizes all content. Several specialized subcommittees lead the design of certain elements or worship resources that serve the specific needs of churchgoers, musicians, and pastors.

For example, the Hymnody Committee evaluates which hymns to include in the new hymnal. Similarly, the Psalmody Committee is completing the text of the Psalter, a resource containing the full text of all 150 psalms with multiple musical settings for each. Other subcommittees focus on rites and Scripture as well as the technology for and communication of the project.
