INTRODUCTION

PURPOSE

Hebrews 13:22 Now I urge you, brothers, to bear with this word of encouragement, for I have written you only a brief letter.

- Hebrews is a letter written to advise and encourage Christians who know they are "aliens and strangers on earth" on their way to "a better country"
- The author wrote to a specific audience. He wanted them to do certain things. He told them why they should do it, always backing up his reasons with passages from the Old Testament. Approaching Hebrews in this way, we find three simple and memorable commands in Hebrews:
 - \circ $\:$ Listen to the word of God revealed through the Son, Jesus
 - Draw near to God through the High Priest, Jesus
 - Endure through faith, which looks up to Jesus
- To urge people to not abandon their faith in Christ

Hebrews 13:18-19, 22-23 Pray for us, because we are sure that we have a good conscience, and because in everything we want to conduct ourselves in an honorable way. ¹⁹ I urge you to do this even more, so that I may be restored to you quickly. Now I urge you, brothers, to bear with this word of encouragement, for I have written you only a brief letter. ²³ I want you to know that our brother Timothy has been released. If he arrives very soon, he and I will see you.

- We do not know who wrote Hebrews. But we know the author was obviously known by his hearers and did not wish to emphasize his own personal identity. Instead, he spoke God's Word in a humble way as one who had heard it from those who had heard it from the Lord.
 - In every part the authorship of the Holy Spirit is apparent

Hebrews 13:24 Greet all your leaders and all the saints. Those from Italy greet you.

 - The teaching in this book on the lasting city of God (13:14) would discredit the secular claim that Rome was an eternal city
 - Quotations from the book of Hebrews in other writings in Rome shows that the book was well known in Rome
 - Readers were a definite group of Christians with whom the author had once lived and with whom he hoped to be reunited

Hebrews 5:12 In fact, though by this time you ought to be teachers, you need someone to teach you the beginning principles of God's word all over again. You have become people who need milk, not solid food.

> They had been in the faith for some time, but were now in danger of growing stagnant

Hebrews 10:32-36 Remember the former days when, after you were enlightened, you patiently endured a great struggle of sufferings. ³³ Sometimes you were publicly shamed by insults and persecutions. At other times you became companions of those who were treated this way. ³⁴ Indeed, you also sympathized with those in prison, and when your possessions were seized, you accepted it with joy, because you knew that you yourselves had a better and lasting possession. ³⁵ So do not throw away your confidence, which has a great reward. ³⁶ Certainly you need patient endurance so that, after you do God's will, you may receive what was promised.

- > They had previously suffered persecution, but were now in danger of suffering more
- > They were still believers in Christ but were now in danger of turning away from him
- > Would seem to be Jewish in background

"Some have shied away from this book as perhaps one of the most difficult in the New Testament. But what a book it is! It demonstrates the supremacy of Christ and presents him as God's perfect word to man and man's perfect representative with God. It describes Christ's ministry for the people, a ministry that is

still going on in heaven today. It speaks of unshakable rest in a time when all around us is shaking in unrest. It urges the child of God not to sit down or slide backward but to stride forward on the trail blazed by Christ. It picks the child of God up when discouraged and provides him with incentive to travel upward to the eternal home. Surely such a book has much to say to us!"

<u>Look</u>

"In these last days" – The last days refer to what we call the New Testament period, between Jesus' ascension and his second coming.

► READ HEBREWS 1:5-14

<u>Look</u>

- The author of the book of Hebrews quotes directly from 11 OT books, all of which are regarded as God's Word with equal authority and relevance (Genesis, Exodus, Numbers, Deuteronomy, 2 Samuel, Psalms, Proverbs, Isaiah, Jeremiah, Habakkuk, Haggai)
- Hebrews has more quotations from the Psalms than from any other book of the OT. It is the main source for the author's teaching of Christology. (17 quotations of and 16 allusions to Psalms)
- "Angels" It would appear that the people addressed in this book were either worshiping angels or were saying that Jesus was only an angel, capable of powerful signs, but hardly the Son of God.
- "Today" This is not saying that on a certain day God became the Father of Jesus. The Son is eternally begotten of the Father. This verse, however, refers to the time when Jesus was born and carried out his work of salvation. At this time God declared him to be his Son and exalted him. It points to the special relationship that exists between Father and Son not a particular time.

Psalm 102:19-27 "The LORD looked down from his sanctuary on high, from heaven he viewed the earth, ²⁰to hear the groans of the prisoners and release those condemned to death." ²¹So the name of the LORD will be declared in Zion and his praise in Jerusalem ²²when the peoples and the kingdoms assemble to worship the LORD. ²³In the course of my life he broke my strength; he cut short my days. ²⁴So I said: "Do not take me away, O my God, in the midst of my days; your years go on through all generations. ²⁵In the beginning you laid the foundations of the earth, and the heavens are the work of your hands. ²⁶They will perish, but you remain; they will all wear out like a garment. Like clothing you will change them and they will be discarded. ²⁷But you remain the same, and your years will never end.
